July is over, and we are in a hurry to inform you about the latest news in our rehabilitation center. Every week we hold team meetings with employees to solve a difficult question: how to help each of our pupils. Social workers talk about the work done. We learn more and more different stories about why this or that child ended up on the street. Another important part is counseling for children. We try to endear the child to ourselves in order

to find out the truth and help him.

In July, four of our boys returned home. As usual, we visited them afterwards and gave them bags of groceries and basic needs. Other assistance was also provided.

For example, Alan Wanjale was bought a mattress and shorts for school. Alan lives with his grandmother, and during our last visit, the social worker found him sleeping right on the dirty floor. To add to his hardship, his father sold the land he owned and moved in to live with them. This makes the boy's life even more difficult because his father drinks and constantly finds fault in his son.



Cleophas Krop lives with his aunt after his mother was killed and his relatives took on the responsibility of raising the boy. When our social worker came to visit them, they asked us to buy him pants for school since they didn't have enough money.

This year, the school semester in Kenya ended on July 13th and a new one began on July 26th. We help some of the children who don't have normal families: we send them to boarding schools and pay for their education. The school bustle swallowed us up. First, we had to provide the boys with transport and return them all home. And then, 10 days later, we had to buy school supplies, pay for school and send the children back (we have about 20 of such kids).





We're glad that this time we could send Clinton Vekesa to school. Clinton has already become a veteran at Embrace - we've been working with him for about 2.5 years. At first, his parents kept throwing responsibility for him onto each other. We had no other choice but to send the kid to a boarding school. But Clinton couldn't fit in there and ran away, returning to Embrace. We're grateful to God that we had the opportunity to send Clinton to another school that he feels comfortable in. Having contacted the mother, we got her consent to bring the kid to her place during the holidays.

Thank you all for your support. In July, they were able to hold a fair for children so that they could buy clothes for themselves using the points they earned for good behaviour and habits.

Please continue to support our hands in prayer. We believe that thanks to your prayers, God opens ways to help our children.



We would also like to share our great joy: one of the head families of our church has settled down to take on the upbringing of two boys, Lucky and Tobias, who have no relatives. Now two more children will live in a loving family.
