Another month passed very quickly. We are excited to share what happened

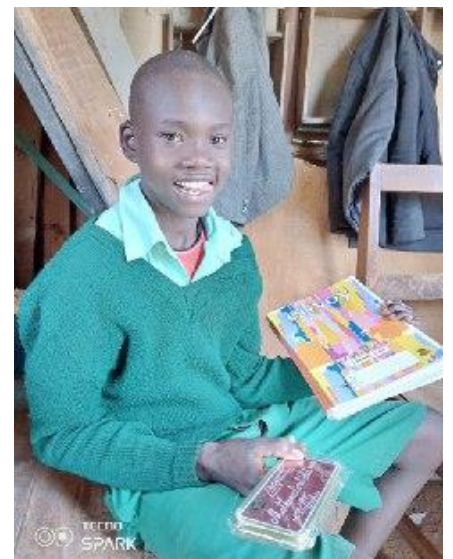


during this period. Every day is like a separate puzzle in a person's life, and especially in the life of street children. Our hearts rejoice at every victory, at every step they take towards a safer and happier life. We see the moment when the

child first decides to cross the doorstep of the rehabilitation center, finds the strength to stay, and later reconnects with their relatives. And we're always happy to help everyone who is open to it.

This way, we're able to connect 11 children with families, 18 send them to school and purchase any necessary materials. After successful rehabilitation, we continue to visit their families, helping them with food packages. This is only one of the ways to find out how a child is doing and whether their relationship with their loved ones has improved.

Patrick Wafula now lives alone in his late grandmother's house. His aunt sent him away and moved to Nairobi, so the boy had to take responsibility for himself at an early age. But that didn't scare him. Right now Patrick goes to school, and he asked us to help him buy everything he needs (a school uniform, a mattress, home clothes and some other things). We are happy to provide him and other children like him with anything they might need.



We cannot forget to mention the story of Brian Kubwang. The boy lives with his grandmother and dreams of going to school, but not everything goes as planned.

The school Brian was enrolled at expelled him after it turned out that he had hearing problems. In other countries, this is not a hindrance to learning on an equal basis with other children. But not in Kenya. Brian is now awaiting treatment and will continue his education at a later time. We believe that his dream will come true.



This month, we were also able to hold a market for children, where they bought clothes, shoes and sweets for points (they are later transferred to money) earned during the

month. This teaches our students to skillfully manage finances and set out priorities. It's interesting to watch them make these choices: clothes or soda, shoes or cookies. It's not easy for them at all.



The story of Tobias is amazing. He is about 5 years old. He was lost and rejected by his family, but found by God. He was brought to



us from the child protection department. Since then, our social workers haven't been able to find out anything about his family. At the very mention of his relatives, tears welled in his eyes. Thankfully, our church leader has decided to adopt the boy. Tobias now has a family that cares for him, and we see how the child blossoms in love and affection. But that is not all. Now Tobias is a student at our school!
